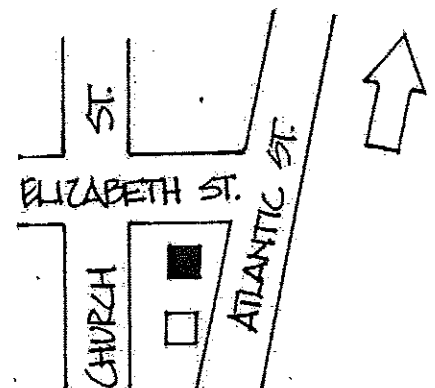

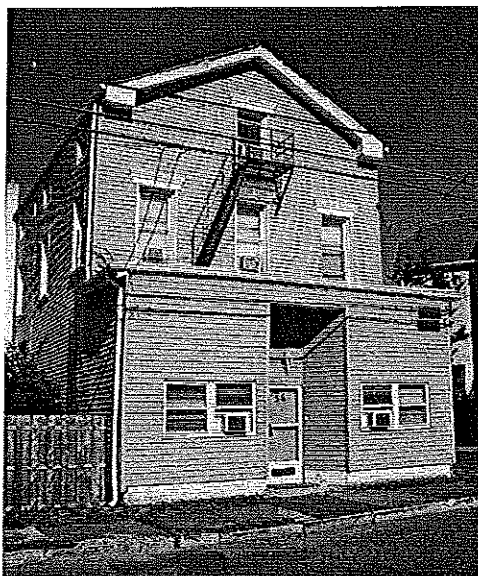
Additional Architectural Description:

The first floor front addition, stucco exterior, and the aluminum sided cornice all detract from what was originally a Greek Revival/Italianate building. The wooden window cornices, side door enframement, and segmental arches on side windows remain to indicate former qualities; walls were originally brick.

2006 update: Entire building covered in vinyl siding; new 1/1 sash windows on upper floor.

SIGNIFICANCE EVALUATION:

Although this building has been extensively altered to its detriment, it was included in the survey because it represents the scale and style of Keyport's commercial structures during its early period of growth prior to the Civil War. When it was constructed in the 1850's, it dominated the corner of Atlantic and Second Streets, and by virtue of its size, continues to do so at present. The building was turned into a store by Mr. Storms and operated as such until the mid 1970s when it was enclosed and converted into an apartment building.

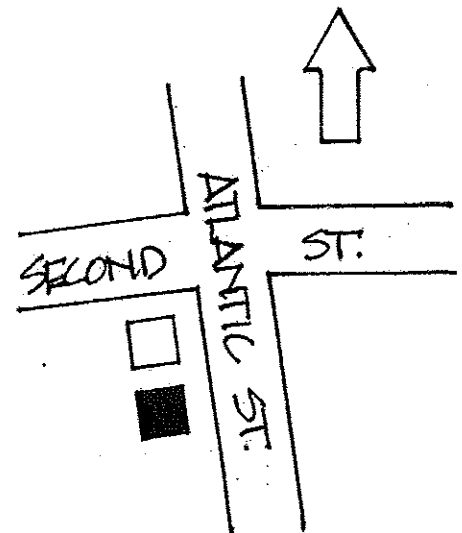
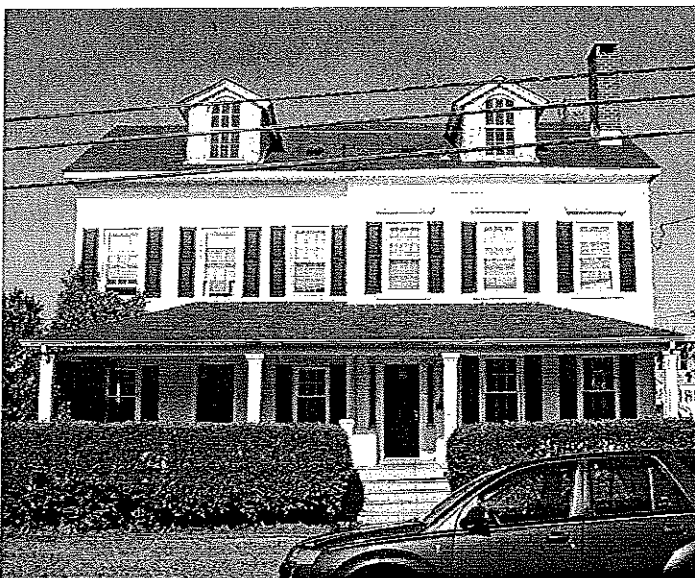
Additional Architectural Description:

House was built in two 3-bay sections; the original Greek Revival house (north end) features a wide frieze, 6/6 sash windows with prominent cornices, pilastered entry with slender 2/3 sidelights; late 19th C. additions include 3-bay south wing, round arch Italianate dormers, and full porch with square posts. Retains much of the original interior woodwork, including stairway, balustrade, wainscoting, door frames, and molding.

2006 update: Downspouts on facade have been removed; front end chimney has been replaced but remains in the same position; round arch windows have been replaced with non-conforming 6/6 sash windows.

This is a particularly well preserved building and one of the earliest remaining on this street. The house retains considerable original detailing on the exterior as well as the interior. Though altered by additions, it stands as a fairly typical statement of the Greek Revival style in Keyport. The two outbuildings, a barn and a smokehouse, make the site unusually complete for an urban area such as Keyport.

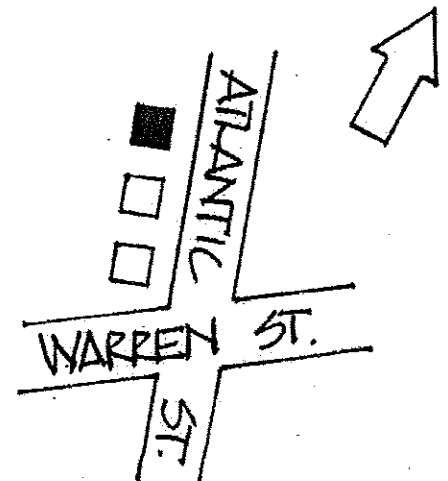
Additional Architectural Description:

Extensive modifications, the most recent being aluminum siding and smaller windows (note enframements), which have obliterated most detailing; remaining early features include the original Greek Revival entry, with transom and sidelight; and the 3-bay porch with square posts; the curious south wing is a composite, exhibiting Victorian elements such as a pointed arch window, projecting bay, and steep pitched cross gable roof.

2006 update: Facade remains the same but a large L-plan addition with a porch has been added at the SW end of the house. It appears to have been added on as part of the first wing, as the chimneys were removed and the back of the wing was raised to 2 stories. All windows have 6/6 sash.

The 1873 Map shows the house was owned by T. M. Walling, presumably Captain Thomas Walling of the First Regiment of Captain William Schanck's company in the Revolutionary War.

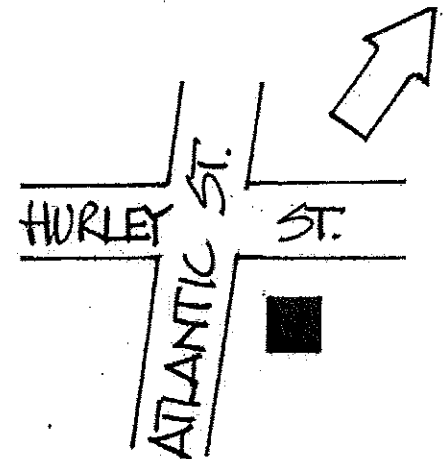

SIGNIFICANCE EVALUATION:

When built, this 5 bay house was on the periphery of the developed area of Keyport. Though modified and in poor condition, it was one of the few remaining old farmhouses in town in the 1980's. Atlantic Street is an old route which becomes the Keyport-Holmdel Turnpike south of Mechanicsville. Map research indicates that a Mrs. Winney owned the property in 1860. In the 1980's it served as a tavern in a largely working-class area. The building has since been demolished and new 20th C. homes have been built on and around the property.
